Capt. Abercrombie (U.S.A.) first visited and ascended the Copper River in 1884 and also Port Valdez in Prince William Sound.

In the spring of 1898 he was directed by the Sec. of War as one of three military expeditions to explore the interior of Alaska, from the Copper river valley northward to the Tanana. Party organized at Valdez. Mr. F.C. Schrader, of the U.S. Geological Survey, a geologist was attached to the party.

In 1899 he continued his work of exploration under instruction to construct a military road from Valdez to Fort Egbert, on the Yukon. Mr. Oscar Rohn accompanied the party as topographer and geologist.

ANDERSON, JACK HARDIN

Jack was born in a small town in Kentucky in 1885. Attended grade schools in Kentucky then moved with his family to Minnesota where he worked in the lumber camps while quite young.

In 1910 Jack headed for Alaska via Edmonton, Canada, the McKenzie River, etc. and ended up in the Cassiar country. With the outbreak of World War I, Jack hit for the States and ended up logging in Boston County, Calif. until 1919. That year he and his partner, Carl Thygesen, came up to Alaska. They bought a small gas-boat and spent their time prospecting and trapping until 1923, at which time they built their log house on the Harding River in Bradfield Canal. They gave up the boating and moved into the house that same year and confined their hunting, prospecting and trapping to the immediate area of Bradfield Canal.

Jack told me that he and Carl too over 300 wolverine and 94 wolves in the first three years in the area. They also had to thin out the bear population and killed over



100 of them in the same period. (Took 100 bear each year)

Apparently things went quite smoothly with the two old fellows until 1952 when Carl had a stroke and had to be taken to the old man's home in Sitka (Pioneer's Home) He died there in 1953 and had believed up until the time of his death that he would recover to go back to his home. Jack entertained the same hope.

Asked about minerals in the area, Jack told me that aside from lead, silver and gold in good quantities, they have staked out a good tin deposit and a very extensive deposit of tourmalines. Other semi-precious stones he claims to have found in the area include rubies and almandite....

In the winter of 1954-55 Jack had to winter in Wrangell with friends as he was failing in health. Before locking up his place, Jack told me that he was coming back to get the tourmalines and would market them in the States then spend his winters with his sister in Florida..... In Sept. 1955 Jack was still at the cabin and each trip I make in there I expect to find him 'belly up' on his bunk..... (Oct. 10, 1955)

## ARCHIMANDRITOF

1848-1850

(Capt.) Russian.

Toward the close of the Russian occupation of Alaska Capt. Arch.-- commanded one of its vessels in the colonies. He made surveys in Kenai peninsula and around Kodiak in about 1850, but published nothing. It is probable that some of his results were used in Tebenkof's atlas. Copies of his manuscript maps were in use by the Russian skippers and others at the time of the purchase, and some fragments reached the Coast Survey. A survey by him of Graham harbor (Port Graham), in Cook inlet, was published in the Coast Survey atlas of Harbor Charts, 1869.

BAHRT, HARRY L, Jr.

"Mr. Bahrt is a printer and set type on one of the first papers published at Sitka"

"His father, Harry L. Bahrt, Sr. came to Alaska the year of the massacre on the Queen Charlotte Islands, way back in the 1870's. He was chief gunner in the Revenue Service and on duty with Pacific S.S. Co. vessels. He settled in Sitka in 1879.

When the Baranoff Castle burned on the night of Mar. 4, 1894 it was Bahrt, Sr. who gave the alarm and saved Judge Rogers, who was asleep at the time in the castle. He died in Sitka in May, 1910.

Henry Jr. (I think the name is Henry rather than Harry) says that an Englishman named Kernelia was the first owner of the ALASKAN, the first paper published at Sitka. He set type for this pioneer paper for 6 pennies per day and delivered the papers.

"At one time there were two papers, the ALASKAN and the HERALD, but later they consolidated and the office

was moved to the old Club building, now torn down.

"Henry Bahrt, Jr. was born in Sitka in August 1880 and married a girl from Georgia."
